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Ed's Note Not everybody uses Facebook!! - That hardly comes as a big surprise to most people; but consider this:-

Recent statistics show that 90% of the population of England have inernet access, and of those, 21% do NOT use Facebook at all (possibly even more now due to recent controversies). Using those figures to (possibly not very accurately) look at Facebook useage in Iwade shows the following. Putting Iwade's population at say 4000, that means that 90% = 3600 have internet access and 400 do not. Of those 3600, 21% do NOT use Facebook = 756. Added to the 400 who do not have access to the internet that means over 1100 residents in Iwade do not use Facebook!!

I am often asked why The Observer did not advertise such and such a thing or why we did not report on something else. Your event or activity may have been successsful by dint of being publicised on Facebook but did you realise that over 1100 people may have been excluded from knowing about it!
