

(Ed's note - by the time you read this Hayley will have done her run -April 23rd - so we wish her well belatedly, but don't forget it will still be OK to donate!!) I've always been quite keen on fitness and regularly attend classes at my local leisure centre so growing up I always wanted to take part in the London Marathon. I always felt inspired by those running it on the TV; everybody coming together in the capital of our country, supporting each other and most importantly raising money for very worthy charities. I'd applied for the ballot three times and been unsuccessful but this year I contacted a charity whom I felt was very special - Children with Cancer UK.

We've virtually all been affected by Cancer at some point in our lives and unfortunately over the past 8 months I have had a few friends and family affected by this vile illness. To know the pain and suffering they've experienced as adults is bad enough but to know young children suffer in this way too is simply awful and, for some, miss out on vital years growing up. Therefore I was honoured to be asked to run for them in the 2017 London Marathon, but it wasn't too long before I started to doubt if I'd done the right thing.

I started to run the odd 5km Sittingbourne parkrun. Being an asthma sufferer I could barely catch my breath and had to keep stopping. I have also since discovered I have one leg 1.5cm longer than the other so have an imbalance which causes pain in one side! I persevered for a few weeks but felt I wasn't getting any better. Over the winter period I kept putting off

completing any training and my phase was always "I'll start tomorrow". Eventually in February my partner forced me to print off a training plan and encouraged me out for my first run. Since then I have progressed slowly and gradually the distances have increased before feeling the need to stop and catch my breath. The furthest I've run to date is 17 miles. Wow, who'd have thought it. I certainly wouldn't have. It's been a long hard process especially as most of it has been in the cold, wind and rain and many a time I have doubted what I am doing but I always think back to those defenceless children who have done nothing to deserve such pain and suffering and hope that my fundraising and raising awareness for the charity goes some way to helping prolong their life or certainly put a smile back on their faces.

A COMMUNITY ORCHARD IN KENT

Deep in the Kent Downs the old traditional orchards are characterised by tall, spreading, wide spaced trees, with sheep grazing beneath. These orchards stand majestic, their limbs burst forth with blossom during the springtime. The cherry their boughs laden with a profusion of white blush flowers, but be guick before the delicate petals fall like drifts of snow upon the ground around these stately trees. Followed, oh so quickly by the apple blossom blushed with pink, whilst flaunting their overskirts like ballet dancers pirouetting amongst the hills. The buzz of the bees as they bask in the warmth of the sun breaks the silence of the countryside and makes this flower a fruit to be remembered whilst these orchards must not be forgotten.

However, down through the undulating lanes in the villages and hamlets of Kent, a

Community Orchard movement is fast becoming the norm. With orchard celebrations to include wassailing, blossom picnics to Apple Fest pressings, the orchards are rejoicing with a new sustainable future. Community orchards are being restored to their former glory by members of the local communities and landowners. Heritage research is being adopted to discover and enjoy the horticultural and social tradition of the areas as well as celebrating the history of these orchards through a myriad of events and activities. The communities are managing each orchard sympathetically with sheep grazing beneath the boughs where possible; biodiversity is upper most in the parish's mind.

The old traditional orchard is fast becoming a communal asset for the whole parish, a meeting place, a place to celebrate, a classroom for students, it can improve our diet, enliven the curriculum and a place to reflect and relax. These orchards offer local distinctiveness with communities banding together to save their own vulnerable varieties with new plantings.

Up and down the country community orchards are appearing, in small hamlets, in new building schemes, in hospital grounds and even the centre of London. They offer a green space in amongst our ever expanding villages and towns, a change for the better, a mosaic of greenness in which to contemplate, a food source for humans, birds, insects and small mammals. These community orchards have an ever expanding value to all aspects of life; have you checked out yours, the blossom has been beautiful this year, let's hope for lots of fruit this summer.



Visitors/Public Time

- 1. Visitors Debbie Tsigarides attended, representing CLBD, the company submitting the planning application (see Planning below). Residents voiced their concerns with this application; mainly regarding use and parking. When asked how many would reside in the property Debbie responded six but the CQC would make the final decision on the actual amount. Once in use she advised that should residents have concerns or complaints they can take this up with CQC, who in turn will contact her. Residents complained that they had not been made aware of the application; the Chair advised that normally notification is only sent to adjoining properties.
- 2. County and Borough Councillors Borough Cllr. Stokes called into the Medical Centre to try to ascertain what is happening as regards staff. He spoke to Alister Andrews at Swale Council regarding fly tipping; the fine is £40 at present but he asked if it can be increased to £500.
- **3. Community Warden/PCSO** Warden's report noted issues included mainly fly tipping, assisting victims of scammers, predictive Policing. The PCSO, Jason Wilde, introduced himself; he is temporarily covering lwade.

Hall – There has been a problem with the drains; some of the clay pipes had cracked and needed lining at a cost of £2500. Finances are good. There are several quiz nights coming up.

KALC – The Police and Crime Commissioner will be attending the September meeting. CPRE will be present to give a talk on Planning.

Any Other Matters Arising

Cllr. Plumb advised that he has use of a youth bus and two people from the community have volunteered to drive, but he is looking for somewhere to park the vehicle.

Cllr. Langham attended the KALC Media Conference in January. They complimented Iwade Parish on its existing website; recommended creating a Parish Council Facebook site.

Country Eye

Helping Keep the Rural Community in Kent Safe

Country Eye has launched a free App for people living and working in the rural community in Kent. The app records and disseminates information using a smart phone's camera and GPS location settings.

The app has been built to help Kent residents receive rural information and report information quickly and efficiently. It allows users to record and share information on crime, suspicious behaviour and damage in their home community or whilst out and about.

The Country Eye team analyse the information and disseminate it as appropriate. This may include email, text or broadcast to other subscriber's smart phones.

The Country Eye app identifies four different Rural Categories:

- Theft: Vehicle, Metal & Cable, Machinery & Plant, Livestock, Outbuilding, Fuel & Oil and Equine.
- Farm Crime: Arson, Fly-Tipping, Trespass with and without Firearms, Criminal Damage and Suspicious behaviour with and without vehicles.
- Animal, Wildlife Crime: Poaching, Animal Welfare, Endangered Species & Conservation, Hare Coursing and Horse Crime.
- 4. Heritage Crime: Off-roading and Metal Detecting/Night Hawking

Sign up is simple; the system requires a contact number, email address and postcode. Personal preferences can be set to enable the location finder and the users chosen radius of information.

Recording information is intuitive; click the camera icon, take an image, fill in the type of crime, whether you have a crime number, and any other useful information. The location, time and date will be automatically recorded.
