

Odours from land spreading in North Kent - Environment Agency Fact Sheet

Background - In recent years, North Kent has seen increases of waste and non-waste materials being spread on agricultural land..

These materials include paper sludge, sewage sludge and compost and are of great value to the farming industry for crop growing. This fact sheet explains our role in investigating odour issues in North Kent.

Environmental Permitting - The Environmental Permitting (England and Wales) Regulations 2010 introduced Mobile Plant Environmental Permits for the spreading of waste materials on land for agricultural benefit. These permits are required to control and minimise environmental impact from these activities.

How are environmental permits issued? A business which needs an environmental permit must apply to us. Providing that a business can prove it meets all the legal, environmental, technological and health and safety requirements, we are legally obliged to issue the permit, even if some people do not approve of the decision.

How does the Environment Agency regulate against the permit? We regulate against the conditions of its permit. Standard Rules permits carry a generic risk assessment but operators must send us a deployment form for each time they wish to use their permit to either stockpile or spread certain materials.

What is included in the deployment form? Date of operation, Type of material to be spread, Volume of material to be spread, Location of operation, Land owner details, Benefit to agriculture documents, Risk assessment to include local receptors, Waste analysis and Soil analysis

What does the Environment Agency do if the conditions of a permit are not being met? If a business breaches the conditions of its permit, we will take enforcement action in line with our publicly available enforcement and prosecution policy. Options available include a warning, formal caution, prosecution and issuing a notice to take action. It is not always clear cut whether an operator has breached the permit. There is often a test of reasonableness which we will need to investigate and review before we decide what action to take.

What are we doing about odours in North Kent? We know that a large number of residents have been affected by odours in the North Kent area at some stage over the past 5 years. Since the major issues with odours in the summer of 2009, we have been working alongside local councils to influence operators and to remind them of their roles and responsibilities. We have also been working with the large producers of these materials including Countrystyle Group (compost) and Kemsley Paper Mill (paper sludge).

All the companies involved in the spreading of paper sludge have produced a process, communications and risk management document to show how they will manage sludge produced at the paper mill. This has lead to significantly less odours issues with this specific material in 2010.

We continue to work closely with Countrystyle Group to reach a similar satisfactory position and be confident that odour will not be a problem for next year or subsequent years .

Spreading of compost - Some compost can be spread with no waste regulatory controls if certain criteria are met by the producer site. If the compost meets PAS100 specification and the Quality Protocol then this material is seen as a non waste material and therefore can be spread.

Who can I report odours to? If you smell an odour that you think is coming from waste material being spread or stockpiled on land, please report it straightaway to our free incident hotline (see below). Your report immediately helps us build up a picture of the problem. We will contact the operator / contractor on your behalf, but will not share your identity.

When a serious and sustained odour is reported to us, we will seek to attend and investigate to check its source. To prove a breach of the odour conditions on the permit, we need to smell the odour ourselves. This will be done in conjunction with the local authority for the area the odours are coming from.

Property News

It seems like only yesterday that we welcomed Lorraine Appleton from Ward Homes into our office to assist her with the marketing Saxon Mews, their latest development situated just off The Street. The majority of the development found buyers in the short time Lorraine was with us, and the first exchange of contracts has already taken place! The newest arrivals to our village will be moving in during October.

With sales of pre owned homes taking place at a steady pace, lwade continues to hold its own in the current difficult property market, with recent additions to our mailing register coming from as far afield as Ayreshire in Scotland.

However, not all is rosy in the marketplace! The biggest cause of complaint, and frustration, we frequently encounter are sellers who have fallen victim of the unscrupulous actions of a minority of estate agents. These

agents continue to over-value properties with the sole intention of beating down the price during their period of sole agency. With sole agencies often lasting in excess of 16 weeks, sellers who are keen to move for employment reasons often find their well laid plans in tatters through no fault of their own.

Time and time again, we discover properties we have provided marketing evaluations for are coming to the market at asking prices anything up to 20% higher than we recommended. Sadly, time and time again, we revisit the same properties, sometimes several months later, and are asked to commence marketing at the price we recommended originally.

Our advice? Always get three valuations (including us of course!) and compare the three figures given. If one is wildly out of step with the other two be very, very careful indeed before committing to a long term sole agency contract.

Speedway is 40 years old

Sittingbourne Speedway's 40th Anniversary meeting was on 12th September with a good crowd and over 50 heats of racing plus some old friends from the past who were connected with the track in its beginnings there to say hello. It is hard to believe that the track was just a field on the outskirts of Iwade in 1970, but with 40 years of hard work by so many people, some long gone, and others still actively involved in the track, it has developed into a fine venue for training and lower league speedway since that time. The emphasis has always been on finding, encouraging and developing youngsters as they try to make it through to a professional career. There is a long list of riders who have done just that and many came to the Anniversary meeting to see old faces and to talk about the old times.

Although the track has run league racing, amateur meetings and club events, it still thrives on its practice and training days utilising its two tracks. The conveyor belt of talent is still continuing today with training days held at the track and a wide range of people taking part, some aspiring stars and others just wanting to sit on a speedway bike and experience what it is like.

There are exciting times ahead for Kent speedway and at Iwade we are eagerly watching developments at Central Park Stadium.

Village Hall Garden

Valuation of Land – Clerk has received a quote of £400 to value the land owned by the Parish Council to the side of the Village Hall; Clerk is investigating other avenues and will report back.

Fidelity Insurance

According to the Insurers £2,000 is the norm for Fidelity Insurance. The Parish Council can apply to have this amount increased - Clerk instructed to investigate further and report back when details are to hand.

Fraud Update

Clerk has received a response from the bank referring to a discrepancy in the final fraudulent amount. Clerk to respond, enclosing the list of fraudulent transactions supplied by the Police.

ROSPA Report – School Lane Playing Field

Report noted; Clerk to liaise with the Village Handyman regarding any necessary work.

Trees

A budget of £500 was agreed to replace three fruit trees in the Village Hall Garden and to buy bulbs and plants to enhance the green areas of the village.

Clerk requested to contact Swale Borough Council to see if they will replace the dead trees in the village park with new, mature trees.

Green Fingers

It's time to put the garden to bed, tidying away the bedraggled plants. Do you clear everything, so pests have nowhere to overwinter, or do you leave hollow stems and a little mess so the friendly bugs like lady birds have somewhere to shelter in the weather to come? Your decision! There are a number of things you can still do to keep your green fingers busy. Fresh herbs in cooking are a delight; and they are readily available in supermarkets. Make sure you buy the potted ones with roots. They will last for a couple of months if you take care of them, remove the cover and keep on a well-lit windowsill. Water them when necessary and give them some liquid feed every two weeks. Some plants might benefit from dividing and potting on. Pick out the growing tips for cooking and to keep the plant neat and bushy. For every shoot you take, two will grow in its place. It isn't too late for cut price bulbs. Although planting time for bulbs is supposedly past, they will flower even if put in after Christmas, just later. I am going to add hyacinths to my shopping list, lovely around Christmas, and can then be planted outside. by Ann Menzies
