Iwade Health Walk – Pacing things out! James Apps

The recent 'Thank you' meeting for walk leaders took place on the 25th August at Bridge near Canterbury. We had a tasty lunch at the White Horse pub after a walk around Bridge and Patrixbourne, taking in hills and woodland paths on the five mile walk and some of the sights of Bridge on the shorter walk. The sad news is that the two most energetic leaders and organisers are to have their time reduced and the NHS Walking for Health system will be under a new management scheme. Although this may not have an immediate effect it is obvious that the connection with the NHS will be less positive. However, that does not prevent the groups getting on with it.

Now, for a couple of weeks I have been outlining what is required of walkers in our group. The reason being is that we are a 'moderate' walking group (marked on the advertising blurb with two footprints) and that means we have a time and a walking pace to maintain.

We have two longish walks that should take about an hour and three-quarters, one which can be extended to that time, and some we have added on that we can adapt to suit in inclement weather.



The objective is to walk at a reasonable pace that most walkers can manage, be able to talk with a little breathlessness due to exertion, and will have somewhere in the middle of the time a faster pace or an uphill climb. Stopping at points should enable people to catch up with a brief moment of respite with at least one where people can take a drink.

Also the walk leader should be aware and know of a walker with problems on the day and make arrangements to enable that person to enjoy the walk and if needed to return part way. If the pace is too slow then please say so or perhaps join a longer NHS walk, and likewise if the pace is too fast for you, then join a shorter NHS walk. There are enough around for beginners or folks who may need them. The alternative is to devise some hour long short walks in and around Iwade. Any volunteers?

Whatever you need as long as you as the walker enjoy what we do then we have achieved our objective.

The Iwade Health Walk meets each Thusday - come rain or shine - in the Village Square at 10:30 for a 10:45 start. ALL WELCOME.

An open letter from a Concerned Resident - Problem Dogs in Iwade

I would just like to warn residents to be aware when they are out walking their dogs, especially if you let your teenagers or children walk them.

My dog was attacked by another dog in Iwade park last year and needed emergency vet treatment. She did nothing to provoke the attack and was iust on her lead next to me. Since then on several occasions I have come across many dogs off their lead and that their owners cannot control, in the last week alone my dog has been attacked twice!. These dogs do not come back when called and some of them are quite dangerous. This is happening in the field areas to the right of the Old Kingsferry Road, all round the back of the park area and the estate leading over to Grovehurst Road area. It's very frightening when it happens and my dog has been distressed several times. When dogs get attacked it can radically change its personality as they become cautious and defensive and I do not want my dog suffering because of other people's carelessness.

Whenever it happens, the owners try

to catch them and then apologise profusely, often saying they are normally friendly and they normally come back! however, it's still my dog dog warden is now aware of the and myself that are at risk. The dogs coming up are growling and snarling and in some cases, actually biting and also let him know as he is very attacking her.

I know to put her behind me and not to pick her up as that would increase the risk of being bitten myself but I only know that through my dog trainer advising me after her first nasty attack. I just want people to be aware and constantly on the lookout as these dogs just come dashing across the fields at you and it's a frightening situation. I've talked to several other dog owners in lwade who have also been concerned about these dogs off the lead. I would hate for a dog or a child to be badly hurt.

I love dogs and understand they need to run about but please owners. (unless you are 100% sure that you can get your dog back to you in an instant) think of other people and train them better or keep them on a lead.

to call them back and run about trying My dogs recall is far from perfect hence being on the lead the majority of the time. No one should be scared to walk in the fields like I am now. The situation and I would advise anyone experiencing the same problems to concerned. Any further incidents should be reported immediately so that they can be logged and dealt with if necessary. It's such a lovely area to walk in and just a few irresponsible people are ruining it for everyone else.

> Just keep your eyes open is my advice to you and just tuck your dog behind you out of harms ways if one of these dogs comes towards you. I'm not mentioning names and breeds as I don't believe that's fair, and I would like to give those owners (you know who you are!) a chance to keep your dogs under control before someone or someone's pet gets seriously hurt. know how much we all love our pets so hopefully this letter will help everyone enjoy lovely walks without fear or problems.

IWADE PARISH COUNCIL - MINUTES OF THE MONTHLY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held on Wednesday 12 July 2017

Planning

Prior to the meeting Belinda Lamb, Project Officer, Guardians of the Deep, Medway Swale Estuary Partnership will give a talk on 'Guardians of the Deep'. The Guardians of the Deep project is a partnership between Kent Wildlife Trust, Thanet District Council, Medway Swale Estuary Partnership and Kent County Council. It will involve local people in the protection and monitoring of Kent's coastal wildlife, and get young people excited about marine wildlife through a programme of snorkelling activities and practical learning opportunities at coastal sites around the county. The activities within the project will raise awareness of the wildlife importance of these three areas of the Kent coast and involve volunteers in helping to protect them and promote their enjoyment. There will be groups of volunteers involved in this work; namely 'Coastal Citizen Science', 'Coastal Connections', 'Coastal Guardians', 'Undersea Explorers' and 'Wildbeach' - the last group being aimed at Schools.

The Chair thanked Belinda for her presentation and she agreed to forward details for inclusion in the Iwade Observer (Ed's Note - see September's Observer for full information)

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Proposed by Cllr. Horner and seconded by Cllr. Clark, the Minutes of the meeting held on the 14 June 2017 were agreed and signed as a true transcript.

Visitors/Public Time

1. Visitors – A resident raised the issue of the road narrowing and right of way as you go out of the village just past the Medical Centre; the layout seems incorrect could something be done? The Chair advised that this has been raised several times with Highways who state that it is correct. Sadly, it looks as though nothing will be done until there is an accident.

2. Concern over travellers gaining access to the proposed community green next to the Medical Centre was raised; they were advised that fencing around the perimeter is shown on the plans.

3. County and Borough Councillors – Borough Cllr. Stokes has been travelling around the Village with the Environment Warden. County Cllr. Whiting – nothing to report.

4. Community Warden/PCSO – The Warden has yet again been dealing with fly tipping, there were three incidents on Old Ferry Road and School Lane. Looked at vehicles parking on the zigzag lines outside the School. He mentioned two incidents of rogue traders in Kemsley; this is mostly to do with roofing. He will look into the cycling issues.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

1. Linkway and outside School Parking Issues - Nothing heard, chase again and bring back to the September meeting.

2. Shed Project – Agreed to place an article in Iwade Observer to ascertain how many residents are interested. (Ed's Note – again see September's Observer)

3. Iwade Medical Centre – Things are moving forward; there have been meetings between the PPG and the Provider and the latest update is that staffing levels have increased. There is now a named lead GP, although not there permanently and two locum Doctors; they are present every day of the week. There is also an Advanced Nurse Practitioner and a Health Care Assistant. They are obliged to give around 370 appointments per week, at present they are averaging 400.

1. 17/502960/FULL: Rear conservatory: 13 Meadow Brown View Iwade Kent ME9 8XB – no objections.

Correspondence

1. DCLG Park Run Consultation – Noted.

2. KFRS/KALC Fire Hydrant Initiative – Members are happy to support the initiative. However, the map showing the location of Hydrants for Iwade is incorrect, as the new Persimmon development is absent. Clerk to write to Kent Fire Brigade pointing this out and to express concern that Fire Engine access to some parts of the new estate, asking if a vehicle can visit the site to see if the concerns are valid.

3. Swale Borough Local Plan – Inspector's Report – Swale Borough Council now has the Inspector's report. The Inspector has stated that the Council can adopt it for only for the next 5 years and not 20, the reason being that the local roads cannot cope; KCC and Highways England only decided this on the last two days of the hearing.

Finance

1. TU Pay Claim – Noted.

2. Request for Donation for start-up costs – Iwade Medical Centre PPG – Proposed by Cllr. Gale and seconded by Cllr. Cheeseman; agreed the donation of £200.

3. Request for donation – Citizens Advice Bureau – Proposed by Cllr. Hunt and seconded by Cllr. Cheeseman; agreed the S.137 donation of £50.

4. Accounts and Cheques raised at this meeting – Proposed by Cllr. Horner and seconded by Cllr. Clark; agreed the following cheques and accounts to the 30th June, 2017

Projects/Project Updates

1. Village Park – safety fencing down tomorrow, this then leaves a few bits and pieces to do, including an area to install wet pour safety surfacing. Work on the bridge and footpath starts in September/October, benches and plaques next week, the whole project should be finished by the end of the year. Clerk to find out how much a cairn will cost to place near to the WW1 Memorial Trees, to dedicate these trees to the Iwadians who lost their lives during this war.

2. The Barn – bit of a delay with the Kitchen as waiting for the plastering work, this will be followed by further electrical work. 3. Hall – Anniversary celebrations this week, hoping Oliver Doubleday will attend. Bookings slightly down on last year but finances are good.

Any Other Matters Arising

1. The Chair advised that the Parish Council has only received one letter of thanks (Iwade Herons) for donations given this financial year, which is guite sad. He felt that this ought to be taken into account when looking at next year's requests. 2. The issue of Cycle Clubs putting up signs and using the village for time trials, etc., raised again. Clerk requested to ascertain guidelines on what is acceptable by seeking views from KCC, Swale Borough Council and Kent Police, and to seek residents' experiences, via Facebook.

The next meeting of Iwade Parish Council will be on Wednesday October 11th in The Village Hall at 19:30.
