The Village has been victim of fly tipping, especially in the Orchard behind Woodpecker Drive and at the end of School Lane. Football posts, rabbit hutches, children's toys, flower pots have all been dumped, waiting for someone else to clear them up.

This costs the village time and money, and just like vandalism within the village, we the residents have to pay for this. As a

community we should take pride in our properties and surroundings and it only takes a few small minded people to spoil this.

If you do have any items that you want to get rid of and unable to arrange for this. Contact the Parish Clerk on 01795 437053 or Gerry the Community Warden and You may or may not know, the Clean Neighbourhood Environment Act 2005 allow the Parish Council to issue fixed penalty notices for littering, graffiti and flyposting offences.

Alongside this, the Act has brought into play a new system for controlling dogs - 'dog control orders', which replaces the current bylaw system. By using dog control orders the Parish Council will be able to make a range of

This means that their weekends must be spent indoors even on a beautifully summers day. Even their washing cannot be hung out since it would need rewashing

Sittingbourne Speedway Club does advise these residents of their yearly calendar and in 2005 they had planned 138 meetings which were to include 24 Sundays. 
The amended Abatement Notice states that the Sittingbourne Speedway Club should give the residents ten days notice before using the track on a Saturday or Sunday. Nowhere does it say that they can change a meeting date, if they have had to make a cancellation. This

procedure of cancelling and rescheduling a meeting with only short notice is making it impossible for the residents of Raspberry Hill Lane to plan any event, such as a barbeque, that involves being outdoors.

Mr Cook advised the Parish Council that last year he had arranged a family function avoiding carefully any speedway fixtures. The date of the function was 31st July and on the 11th July he received a letter from the Speedway Club informing them that they had cancelled meeting that was schedule to be held on the 10th July and would be rescheduling it for 31st July. At this stage it was not possible to change the family function.

Residents of Raspberry Hill Lane are finding it difficult to work around the Speedway Calendar and it makes their lives hard enough without the dates being changed at the last minute. They should, like anyone lese, be able to plan events without the fear that they will be ruined by the noise, dust and smell of speedway.

These residents live on Raspberry Hill Lane, and are not visitors as the Speedway Club are, yet they have to run their lives around them. They cannot enjoy the peace of their own gardens with any freedom, and cannot enjoy what summer we do have; instead they are shut up indoors on a summer's day without even being able to open a window.

# Good news for the village store

The Government's £3000 million package for support for the rural post office network over the next two years has now been given state aid clearance by the European Commission. The extension of this support to the rural Post Office network depended on the UK persuading Europe that this did not represent unfair state aid. The EC decision

confirms that funding can continue to be made available from 1st April 2006 to 31st March 2008. Minister for Competitiveness, Barry Gardiner MP said: 'The Government has made unprecedented investment of more than £2 billion to help maintain the Post Office network since 1997. We welcome its pledge to support the rural Post Office network for a further two vears'

### Village Centre Update

The presentation from Mick Drury, of Wards Homes was cancelled due to prior engagements by Mr Drury. However Mr Drury did advise the Parish Clerk that ONE STOP had agreed to go into the village centre and the Chemist has purchased two units on this information. The other retail outlets will consist of Hair and Beauty, Florist and Chinese Takeaway, as well as the nursery.

### Seaside Community Recycling within Iwade

The Organisers of the Iwade Recycling are please with the uptake of the village. At the present moment 48% of the village are using the recycling facility. Since Iwade came into this project 100 tonnes of landfill has been saved.

However the scheme is funded by the EU and if funded is agreed for this year, the scheme organisers are hoping to include plastic into the recycling, the only place at the present moment that take plastic for recycling is based in the North of England.

New developments within the village will be included in this recycling scheme and at the present moment this recycling programmes is being run at no cost to the village.

Iwade Parish Council wishes to encourage more residents in Iwade to use this recycling facility and help save the area and environment.

Kent Medway Structure Plan, January 2006

Iwade Parish Council object to the increase provision of Housing for Swale from 8,300 to 9,100 dwellings.

#### Reasons:

- 1. PPG Note 3 Paragraph
  23: National target is that by
  2008, 60% of additional housing
  should be provided on previously
   developed land and through
  conversions of existing
  buildings....
- 2. The emerging Swale Borough Local Plan Para 4.78 states that the current requirement for new building will

only meet the requirement of the K&MSP housing target of 30% previously developed land. This includes housing sites which fall within the flood risk area. The Iwade Parish Council objects to further allocation of Greenfield land which is not already included in the structure plan and the emerging SBLP

3. A further major concern is the shortage of fresh water which is continuously brought to our attention by the water companies. The Iwade Parish Council does not believe that this is a temporary situation and that global warming and its effect on our climate is being ignored by Government and all levels by the Planning Authorities. The older par of Iwade Village and some of the newer houses suffer poor water pressure at peak hours.

Iwade Parish Council objects to any increased housing provisoin for Swale as proposed by FPMOD 7.1


