

Minister of Transport announces New Name for the New Crossing

The Highways Agency received more than 700 entries for the Name the Crossing competition and the Judging Panel met in December 2005 to choose the winning entry. Entries received included names based on naval and aviation themes and figures from the Islands history.

The most popular names suggested were variations incorporating the words Sheppey or Swale. Judging Panel considered that there was strong local support for a name that would convey a sense of local identity, be also unique and something to the majority of local residents. It was felt that the name 'The Sheppey suggested Crossing', by Minister-on -Sea Mr Grimwade, satisfied these criteria best...

Dr Stephen Ladyman, Minister of Transport, said; "We are delighted with the response to the competition to name the bridge. The name reflects the local identity of this important project. The Sheppey Crossing is evidence of the Governments commitment to improve transport in the area and we look forward to its opening in

the summer".

Work has progressed well during the early part of the winter and if the relatively mild weather continues, the new Sheppey Crossing will be open to traffic in the early summer.

Almost 10,000 tonnes of the British steel used to construct the new crossing is now in place. The steel work from Piers 1-7, 8-14 and 17 to the northern abutment launched into place using a jacking mechanism to push the steel skeleton of the bridge deck into place from each end of the work site. The remaining sections of bridge deck (Piers 7-8 and Piers 15-17) were lifted into place during October and November.

Construction of the bridge deck has progressed quickly and placing the pre-cast concrete planks on top of the steelwork is complete. The in situ concrete slab now extends north from the southern abutment on the mainland as far as the northern shore of The Swale and south from the railway line towards Pier 15.

The new crossing will measure 21½ metres in width, wide enough for two lanes of traffic in each direction. Construction of 2½ metre reinforced concrete cantilevers on either side of the main deck, to provide the required width of the crossing, started in October and will continue into spring 2006.

Work to lay the low noise surface on top of the bridge deck will start in late spring.

Construction of the new road between the new crossing and Queenborough has advanced well and some sections of it are almost complete. Further low noise road surfacing works and the installation of street lighting and signage on the new road will be carried out during the early part of 2006


On completion of the construction of the Improvement Scheme, there will be two route on and off the Isle of Sheppey, via the Sheppey Crossing and dual carriageway or via the existing Kingsferry Bridge and local road.

Traffic between mainland Kent and the Isle of Sheppey will travel along the dual carriageway Iwade bypass straight over the new crossing and onto the Island. Access to the east and west sides of the Island will be possible from the new Cowstead Roundabout approximately 1½ miles north of the new crossing.

The Kingsferry Bridge will be retained for local traffic and will provide an alternative route to the new crossing on and off the Isle of Sheppey. Travelling onto the Island, a dedicated slip road leads off the dual carriage wav to the Kingsferry Roundabout and along the existing single carriageway road over the Kingsferry Bridge onto Sheppey Way to the Cowstead Corner Roundabout. Leaving the Island, a dedicated slip road leads south from the Kingsferry Roundabout, under the new crossing before merging with the southbound dual carriageway of the Iwade Bypass.

A dedicated footpath and cycleway on this local route will be available for pedestrians and cyclists who, for safety reasons, will not be permitted to use the new high level crossing.

Iwade School Keep Clear Marking **Enforcement**

The Council have made a traffic order that will allow enforcement action to be taken against drivers who park on yellow School Keep Clear markings. The purpose of the school keep clear marking is to create an area in front of the school accesses that increases the visibility of pedestrians and school children. The Councils attendants undertake the enforcement and will issue fixed penalty notices to vehicles parked on the markings.

The traffic order will apply during the following times during school drop off and collection times:

8.30am to 9.30am Monday to

2.30pm and 5.00pm Monday to

The restrictions will only apply during term times.

The restrictions have been implemented in this way to balance the needs of Iwade residents while making sure that the yellow School Keep Clear is observed during the school drop off and collection times. The markings will be enforceable once the signs indicating the restrictions have been erected on site. It is anticipated that the signs will be put in place during February and March 2006.



Future Plans for Iwade Water Supply

For the future, Swale Water is considering a number of options for new supplies. These include both building new and raising existing reservoirs. Other options, such as desalination and effluent re-use are also possible in the future. However, major new resources take many years to design, promote and construct and the environmental impact and cost need to be taken into consideration.

Their first contingency plan is to extend the present drought order concerning Bewl Water. The Environment Agency has agreed a Drought Permit to help refill Bewl reservoir, which dropped to the lowest level ever seen as a result of the worst drought in nearly 100 years. Bewl Water is currently only 35 per cent full, when normally at this time of year it would be nearer to 90 per cent. They applied to the agency for emergency powers to help refill it - relaxing the conditions under which it is allowed to take water from the River Medway.

You have commented on

development and I would explain that Southern Water is involved in the planning process at two levels, long term planning for water resources and also with the every day planning process when we look at the needs of a specific development.

With regard to long term planning, you may be aware that future development proposals are set out in two main documents, the County Council Structure Plan and the District Local Plans. These plans set out development proposals, as approved by Government. Both Plans are subject to consultation, which takes place over two draft stages, and finally at an Inquiry in public. At the conclusion of this process, the Plans are adopted. Southern Water is a stakeholder in the consultation process and our involvement ensures that we have a sound, comprehensive up to date knowledge of planned development in the South East and at the same time we can also inform those responsible for the Development Plan process on water issues.

From this planning, Southern Water produces forecasts of future water demand that takes into account the development proposals within the Plans. They then produce water resource plans to show how we intend to

meet those future demands through a mix of demand management measures and new resource development. These water resource plans produced to replicate the demands and supplies available in a design situation that is representative of design drought conditions. These plans are subject to approval by our economic regulator, OFWAT, and their environmental regulator, the Environment Agency.

Looking at demand in the shorter term, the planning application process is the process by which the local Planning Authority individual decides whether developments can proceed. This "everyday" process is under the control of the local Planning Authorities and Southern Water is not a statutory consultee. Nevertheless, as a water and sewerage undertaker, Southern Water is often consulted with regard to planning issues. While planning and building control are decisions responsibility, clearly there can be an impact on our services, and we would always want to comment on developments. They are able to ask that conditions be attached to the permission; planning for example, they can ask that a developer contact them to have capacity checks undertaken, or

that connection is made at a particular point.

As regards businesses, public transport vehicles are excluded from the hosepipe ban. Public service vehicles are those capable of carrying more than eight persons at separate fares. Taxis or driving instructors' vehicles are not public service vehicles. Goods vehicles such as vans are also exempt, although company estate cars are not. The restrictions also apply to garage forecourts, except when a hosepipe is used to remove the wax off brand new

The present restrictions do not apply to parks, recreation areas, swimming pools, fishponds, public buildings, construction businesses and private patios or drives.

As a company, they are willing to write to or visit customers reported as not complying with the hosepipe ban. Should you wish to notify them of the address of particular customers by e-mail, they will be happy to do so. I can assure you that any details forwarded to them will be treated as confidential.

After six weeks of training, I am now walking the streets of Iwade to get to know the area, and find out what challenges will be facing me in this post. If you do see me walking around please stop and say hello and introduce yourself. I am part of a county wide team of 90 Community Wardens and 10 Rural Police Community Supports Officers to help crime prevent by encouraging the building of strong communities and discouraging anti-social

behaviour.

I am hoping that helping the running of a village is a lot like running a factory. Solving all the small problems is the key to larger success and I look forward to working with everyone here to make Iwade an even better place to live.

I have always enjoyed meeting new people, and hopefully my interpersonal skills will be a big help when supporting this wonderful village that's seems to be growing by the day.

One of my roles is patrolling the area on foot to provide a highly visible local presence, gathering intelligence and promoting community safety. I can recommend community projects in their area for Kent County Council grants, which must be match-funded by other agencies and have obtained a grant of £500 to go towards the Youth Club minibus. Iwade Resident being victimised.

Unfortunately life in Iwade village for one resident in The Street is not so sweet and rosy. It has been brought to the



attention of the Iwade Village News that a resident in Iwade is currently experiencing youth problems within the village, and when this resident has contacted the police for assistance no support is being received.

Local Youths are congregating in the mornings to catch the bus to School from the Sandling Way bus stop, and instead of just waiting they are throwing stones, and causing criminal damage to this resident's vehicles and property.

Since 2004 the youths have caused over £3,000 worth of damage, which this residents has had to pay, as his insurance company will no longer pay out for the damage to his vehicles. During 2005 the damage increased and on a regular basis experiences

damage to his windscreens, windows, roof and guttering. This residents has also been subject verbal abused by the youths

The Parish Council have been made aware of this problem and are becoming aware of a growing number of people within the village who deplore the apparent lack of response from the Police and the deterioration of protection afforded to greater community from a small but menacing group of malcontents.

The Parish Council have contacted the local secondary schools and advised them that the Parish Council will not tolerate such behaviour in this village. Also Sergeant Darren Ryder of Swale Police has also been informed, and police surveillance will be enforced. The new Community Warden



has also been deployed to monitor and observe these areas.

Once again the Parish Council, the team at the Iwade Village News and the residents of Iwade would like to see the positive side of our local youths not the negative portrayed by the minority who vandalise and destroy the village


Woolpack Celebrations




