The Medway Swale Estuary Partnership is a voluntary forum that seeks to address the various issues facing the estuary and its communities. Walking around Iwade

There are now an average of 20 people who turn up every week on Thursdays to take part in the Health Walks around Iwade. The aim is to get people walking, which is good for the heart and also get people talking, as it is a social activity. We meet at the Village Centre at 11am, starting the walks at 11.15am and finishing at 12 pm. There are a variety of walkers, from young mums with pushchairs to all ages of the active retired. It was decided from the start that dogs would not be allowed.

Most of the walks are around the village estates and parks, but since February the group has been split so that some walkers could experience the footpaths across the countryside.

One particular walk, after leaving the Village Centre, starts north of the village, at the footpath on the left side of the Old Ferry Road crossing the stile. It then continues westwards towards the estuary to the drive to Raspberry Farm, where it turns left. This is part of the Saxon Shore Way. The views across the estuary and the new Sheppey Bridge are magnificent.

The walk continues along the track, passing the farm, until it meets the stile and continuing the Saxon Shore Way for approximately 500 metres to the next way mark, where the walk leaves the Saxon Way and follows the track left towards the village. It enters the village at the stile near Stangate Drive and finishes back at the Village Centre. It is about two and a half miles long. In the future it is hoped to take longer walks around Iwade and even go further afield to places like the R.S.P.B.Bird Sanctuary at Elmley. Phone 476274 for details. by Lynda MacGowan

Out of Date?

Motorists risk prosecution after failing to spot the extremely small print on their photocard licence which says it automatically expires after 10 years and has to be renewed - even though drivers are licensed to drive until the age of 70.

The fiasco has come to light a decade after the first batch of photo licences was issued in July 1998, just as they start to expire. Drivers will have to a pay £17.50

to renew their card

Official DVLA figures reveal that while 16,136 expired this summer, so far only 11,566 drivers have renewed, leaving 4,570 outstanding.

Gardening by Ann Menzies

Despite the cold winter we are being told spring is emerging 3 weeks earlier than it used to. My garden is looking a picture, with primroses everywhere, pots of pansies and miniature daffodils in full bloom and lovely pink camellia flowers shining against the glossy dark green leaves. If any of you are tempted by the camellias in the garden centres, don't forget they hate lime, so our soil is not really suited to them. However I have two wonderful specimens planted in pots of ericaceous compost which I water with rain water, especially in late summer and autumn. If they dry out at this time you may stop the production of flower buds for the next spring.

April is a busy month for anyone with a garden, getting rid of

small weeds now will save you a lot of time later on in the year when you really want to be sitting outside just enjoying your garden. For those of you who grow your own vegetables; and there's no excuse for any of you not to; now is a really busy time. The soil is warmer, so get out there and plant something to eat, even if it's just a pot of mixed salad leaves. With such a small garden I'm growing loads of stuff in pots, spinach, turnips, lettuce, radish, the list goes on and on. Choose small varieties, there are lots recommended for container growing now, so browse the seed displays and have a go. I bought some of the water retaining crystals; they swell to big lumps of clear jelly when you add water, so are great to put in pots to stop them drying out so quickly. They work for

flowers too; in fact they were originally marketed for hanging baskets. Don't be fooled by the bright sunshine though, the temperatures can still fall dramatically at night, so hold back on planting out tomatoes and peppers and keep an eye on the forecast. Taking the time to spread a bit of fleece over your tender young seedlings will pay dividends later.

It appears we have not learnt anything with 'modern' living. We currently make the same request. PLEASE DO NOT use the churchyard to exercise your dogs. Thank you.

So many people have marked this time of Lent in their daily lives, and not necessarily regular church people! It's good to see, yet ask someone why they do it and what is Lent and the answers have been very varied.

'A time to give up' 'a time to deny yourself', or ' because I always try to do something' are the most popular explanations of Lent. They're all right, but it also means much more... a time to take something on...maybe a commitment to following the faith in a deeper way, or a determination to stop being so negative in everyday matters or even a commitment to like the ones we dislike! Well done if, whatever you committed to, you managed to master! We don't all succeed, but we can always try!.

As we now enter the period leading up to Easter, try and take time to read, to meditate or even to pray about all the events of that unforgettable week of Christ's passion and His sacrifice. Wherever you are on the road of faith, whether just beginning, far along the road or maybe not even on it yet, just let it sink in that when Jesus Christ died on the Cross, it was neither an unfortunate accident nor a sign of failure! Because whether we have professed the faith or not, Jesus' death on the cross was a conscious act to set us ALL free from the guilt of so much wrongdoing - sin! The Bible tells us quite clearly that: 'Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man, someone might possibly dare to die. at SBC which confirmed there was no money allocated for allotments. Chairman confirmed that SBC was in discussions with the developers to provide allotments. Cllr J.Gregory said that the allotment committee was looking at other ways of funding.

Lighting Grant - The Chairman and Cllr B.Groves attended a meeting at Bobbing Village Hall and a further meeting will be arranged with KCC to explain and discuss the lighting grant. Borden Parish Council is incurring all the costs of these meetings and has asked for a small contribution towards the costs. The council agreed to contribute.

Chairman has received a letter from Lamp Lighters thanking them for the PC contribution. Cllr Stokes announced that a new batch of roads have been adopted by SBC. A list is available on the SBC web site.

The Chairman announced that a **Broadband meeting** will be arranged soon in the village hall.

KCC Offer Broadband Solution?

Put Tuesday 14th April at 7pm Iwade Village Hall in your diary for a public Broadband meeting with representatives from KCC namely Mr Gurr and Mr Walker.

Whilst Iwade has been identified by KCC as a 'not spot' (an area with poor broadband) **the purpose of the meeting is for KCC to explain the options and to establish a real community interest**.

So your job is to attend the meeting and show a community interest. We need at least 60 residents to attend the meeting to really show them we need a faster cheaper service that will enable us to access the amazing resource that is the internet more effectively. Peak times are the worst in lwade if you are getting your broadband down a BT line (albeit not necessarily through BT).

So come on Iwade let's see what we can do for surfing in our village and let's show KCC we mean business.

School Crossing Group by Cillr Roger Truelove

The Working Group looking at safety and congestion outside the school met on Monday 9th March. The Working Party included 12 members, made up of local residents and parents, the PCSO, Parish ClIrs, Borough ClIr and County ClIr.

The Group propose a number of solutions but these will be subject to local agreement at a pre meeting of the PACT meeting, to be held at 6.30 on Tuesday 21st April at Lower Halstow School.

The success of any of the measures proposed depends on local good will and co-operation. Some proposals can be put into place fairly soon. Others longer-term.

The first step should be the introduction of a School Crossing Patrol (a lollipop lady). This has been discussed with the Kent Highways, with the County Education department and the school. There appears to be general agreement this can be pursued.

We also feel there would be merit in moving the yellow zig zag lines down School Lane towards the vehicle entrance to the school. We have discussed this with Highways. It is also thought that bol lards could be erected on the south side of School Lane to stop vehicles parking on the pavement. Highways are prepared to work on this but neither of these changes would be introduced without full consultation.

We are aware that adjacent streets do not want the School Lane congestion displaced into their roads. The School PTA is working hard to establish a Walking Bus, which would reduce the volume of traffic coming into the centre of Iwade. This needs to involve not only the children who live in the village and near to the school, but also children coming in from outside, say from Kemsley or the rural areas to the west of lwade. It is proposed that we try to establish drop off points on the outskirts of the village where children could join the Walking Bus. One drop off point would be to the south of the village and another at the playing field at the top of School Lane. The latter would of course have to be negotiated.

The WoolPack is prepared to allow parking in the morning. This is a generous community gesture. It is felt that this facility needs further advertising, perhaps through the school. That still leaves issues around the afternoon pick up. It is proposed that we discuss with the Village Hall, the prospect of getting grants to improve the car park there, which would be of general benefit to the community, but might also provide an alternative afternoon pick up point. Parish Councillors are pursuing other ideas for car parking in the village.

We have asked PC Anne Jones to come to the meeting on April 21st to outline a Police Scheme that encourages good parking behaviour by parents outside schools. Simply, this provides internal school rewards for children whose parents do not park in a dangerous and irresponsible way outside schools. We would of course need to ask the school to support such a scheme.

The Group discussed the impact of the new housing development at the top of School Lane. The new estate will have its own distributor road, which will take traffic out to the south, whilst the school role will not change.

It is hoped that the Kent Highways scheme to change the junction of School Lane and Ferry Road might add to safety. We have waited a very long time for action on this but details are expected soon and work should start within a few months.

The Highways would not put in a zebra crossing outside the school and it is not possible to find more parking spaces in the immediate vicinity of the school.

Cllr Roger Truelove and PCSO Lindsay Woods welcome your comments on these proposals in particular if you are unable to attend the Parking Meeting at Lower Halstow School on Tuesday 21st April at 6.30pm prior to the 7.30 PACT meeting.
