

CRITERION THEATRE AND HERITAGE CENTRE, BLUE TOWN.

On Monday 1st November at the Monday Friendship Club in the Barnour talk was given by Jenny Hurkett who owns and operates the Criterion Theatre in Sheerness. Jenny came to the UK as a child 68 years ago, this makes Jenny quite uniquein the museum world as a woman and someone from another countryto create a museum on English history.

The building itself has a chequered history being first built in 1868 as a hotel and music hall. On its opening night the star act was a championship dancer with one leg! Its fortunes rose and wanedover the years but it survived until 1917 when a German bomber aiming for Sheerness Docks hit the front of the building. Since then, it has been an RAF motor repair shop, a boat yard, and then in 2004 it was bought by Jenny and her husband Ian as a kitchen showroom. Due to health reasons the kitchen business was sold and Jenny thought about starting a small heritage centre about Blue Town and Sheppey, starting with a showing of a 30 min film about Sheppey as a favour. Now there are three floors of exhibition rooms showing life in Victorian times, World War One, World War Two and a Dockyard room on the top floor. Much of the conversion was done by volunteers who also help run the museum and theatre and of course its in-house and outreach school learning sessions. All these activities are supported financially by the theatre itselfand the shows and events it holds.Recent shows featured Mungo Jerry, Mike d'Abo of Manfred Mann, Roy Hudd of TV fame, Dave Berry, sixties pop star, and many more. Coming soon are Bill Hurd of the Rubettes, Spencer James of the Searchers, a murder mystery night, and of course a Christmas variety show.


