
THANKS AND HELLO!!




IWADE READING AND BOOK GROUP

WEATHER DAMPENS SPEEDWAY'S PLANS

The Club started the new year full of good intentions with an organized plan of track improvements to be completed, the remaining rounds of the Winter Speedway Pitbike Series

scheduled to be run and plans for a few early practices in the pipeline. Unfortunately, these plans were dashed by the heavy rain we had in January which left the main track and parts of the site completely waterlogged for several weeks. This led to a practice being postponed and the winter work plans put back as we just could not get on to the track.

Fortunately, the weather has improved of late and a belated start to the planned work has seen new walls and roof being completed on the pits block, some twenty safety fence panels have been

renewed and the air fence has been sorted, washed, and sent for repair where needed. It is now a race against the clock to get things done as a speedway sidecar practice has been tentatively planned for 26th February!

Things however, could not have been more different on the Club's minitrack as the 2nd and 3rd rounds of the Speedway Pitbike series were completed by the end of January. These were held in some very cold and muddy conditions

> which led to a few crashes in which, fortunately, no one was hurt, nor did it dampen the rider's enthusiasm. The final round was due to be run on 6th February, but bad weather caused this to be postponed and is now scheduled to be completed on 20th February.

Last year the Club ran a motorcycle trial event which proved very successful, and a second event is planned for 13th February with over 20 riders taking part. We are hopeful the

weather will improve, and the remaining work can

be completed in time for what looks likely to be a very busy season.



Welcome and Apologies

The Chair formally welcomed everyone to the meeting. Apologies received and accepted from Parish Cllr. Hyde and PCSO Kirsty Linge.

Declarations of Interest and Dispensations

Minutes of the Previous Meeting

Proposed by Cllr. Whiting and seconded by Cllr. Langham, the Minutes of the Parish meeting held on the 8 December 2021 were agreed and signed by the Chair as a true transcript.

Visitors/Public Time

County and Borough Councillors -

County Cllr. Baldock advised the Government grant received by KCC is not good; money coming in is not sufficient to provide repairs to roads, drains, etc., and it looks like there might be cuts to support for bus services, which is of concern and is something to do with their lack of use. The Swale West Parishes meeting takes place in March, an invite will go out. Cllr. Woodford advised the start date for the Dunlin Walk Appeal Hearing is the 8 February, commencing at 10.00 and will last for about two days.

Community Warden/PCSO -**Community Warden** – Report not received.

PCSO - CRIMES OF NOTE:

Bewick Walk, Group of youths causing a nuisance and smoking cannabis, when approached by residents they

became verbally abusive and left. Once informant window. No damaged gone the residents noticed their Christmas lights had been damaged. Suspects were identified and crime details were taken. It was later decided that due to insufficient evidence the report was be filed.

Bewick Walk – Reports of 3 youths removing a drain cover and street sign before discarding them in the bushes. Damage to the sign was unconfirmed and the drain cover being removed had happened before the youths had arrived (it had been reported earlier in the day). No further action was

Purple Emperor Grove – vehicle pulled up outside an address. A female passenger then exited the vehicle and urinated on the resident's driveway. Resident was spoken with by Police and reassurance was given. It was decided no further action would be taken at the time.

Ridham Dock – reports of nuisance vehicles drifting round the roundabout.

Ringlet Grove – reports of 6/7 youths playing football. The ball has hit the

School Mews - Youths gathering and causing a general nuisance, leaving rubbish and being loud. Youths were not at the location at the time informant reported the incident. Information passed to local officer.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

Planters, The Street/Mansfield Drive -Still awaiting information from Assessor and further input from Kent County Council. Keep on the agenda.

Clerk's Resignation/Responsible Financial Officer – Proposed by Cllr. Dollimore and seconded by Cllr. Whiting, agreed the sum of £80 (actual cost £160, 50% of the cost paid by Bobbing Parish Council) plus VAT. CVs have been circulated to all Members for their input and four candidates selected. Agreed, as the new Clerk will be appointed to cover both Bobbing and Iwade Parish Councils, due to the

number of Councillors that could be present at the interviews (16) and the current worryingly high levels of Covid, that the Chair and Vice-Chair be delegated to conduct the interviews and appoint the new Clerk. Clerk to also attend.

KALC Community Award - Bring back to February meeting.

Grovehurst Road Gateway Entrance -

Response from KCC Highways noted, agreed to add this to the areas being looked at by Cllr. Dollimore and to look at creating a Highway Improvement Plan.

Lighting Grant 2022/23 - Swale Borough Council have advised the grant £51585, £35.36 for a Band D property, will continue.

Correspondence

Kent Minerals and Waste Local Plan 2013-30 Full Review 2021 – agreed to respond that Kent County Council should take a hard line on requiring that Mineral extraction takes place before housing development.

Action: Clerl

Kent Community Rail Partnership -Request for Grant Aid - Proposed by Cllr. Dollimore and seconded by Cllr. Lancashire; agreed a S.137 donation of £50.

Finance

Trees and Plaque costs - Proposed by Cllr. Whiting and seconded by Cllr. Waters, agreed the quote of £2202.62p for 8 Hornbeam Trees, stakes, ties, compost, and delivery. Because of shortages, the Nursery will order the Action: Cllrs. Dollimore/Whiting/Clerk trees but invoice the Parish Council in April, the new financial year. Clerk to research means of planting the trees Action: Clerk and possible costs.

Highway Improvement Plans/Yellow Lines – keep on Agenda. Ask Councillors for ideas.

Budget/Precept 2022/23 - Proposed Action: Cllr. Dollimore by Cllr. Dollimore and seconded by Cllr. Lancashire, agreed a Precept of resulting in no increase to residents. Agreed to request a Lighting Grant of £1950 due to the huge increase in supplier Electricity costs from 25.40p per kWh to 33.80p per kWh.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacon -

Proposed by Cllr. Langham and seconded by Cllr. Waters, agreed to accept the quote of £1250 plus VAT for the Beacon Brazier. Clerk and Cllr. Dollimore to seek costs for the post and installation. Once the post size is known to then advise the Brazier manufacturer so that the correct collar can be made. Bring back to February
