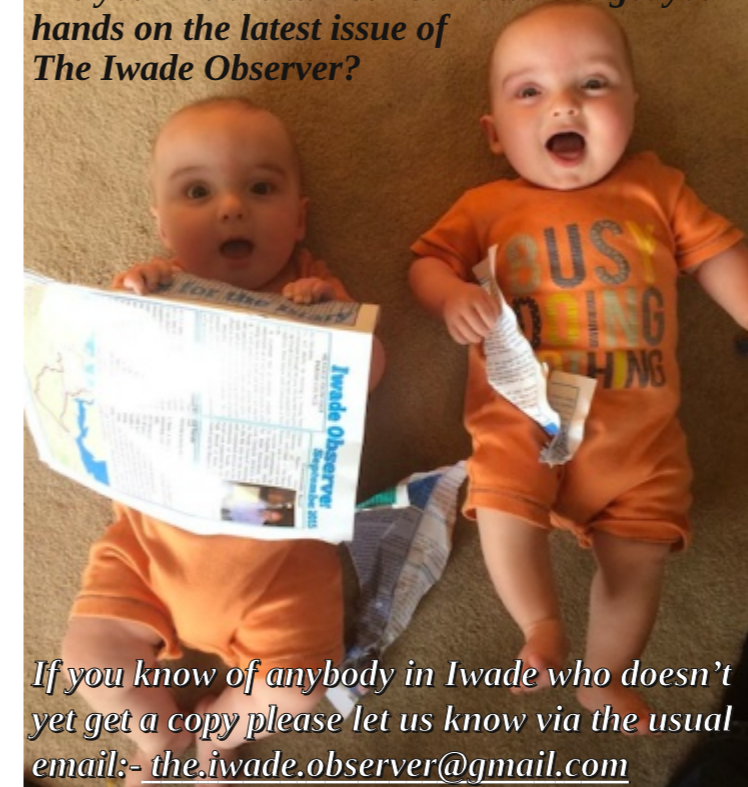

Iwade @ The Barn - Open Day

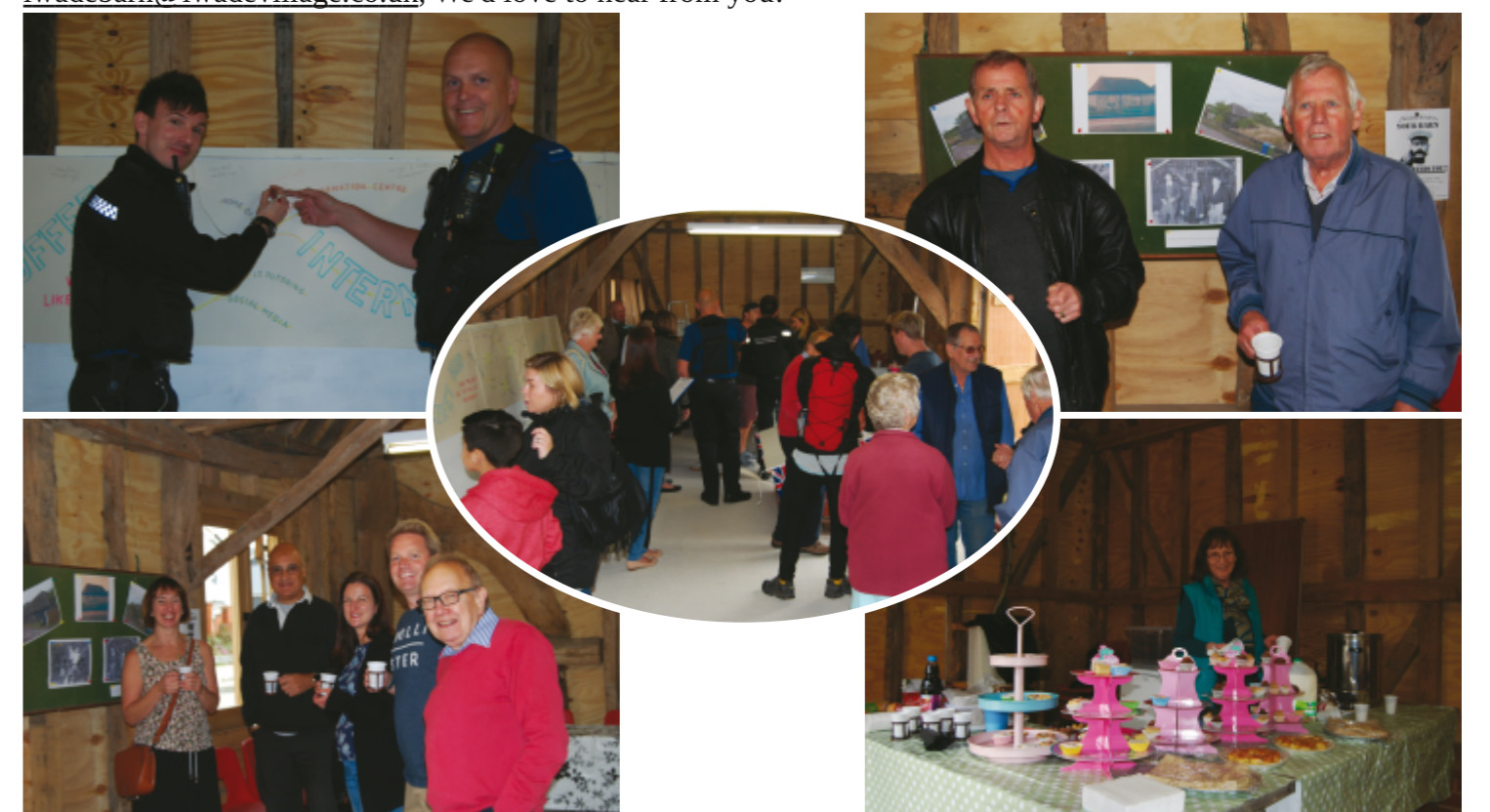

The Barn was finally revealed to villagers on Saturday 10th October. Reduction in Property Management Fees for Iwade Residents

Residents of the Kingsferry Place development in Iwade have seen an estimated £78 a year reduction in their property management fees thanks to Iwade Parish Council and the office of Gordon Henderson MP.

GEM Estate Management were charging residents living in Swallow Avenue, Fulmer Avenue, Redwing Avenue, Bittern Road, Berwick Walk, Woodpecker Drive and Helen Thompson Close to maintain an area of nature conservation land at the back of the development used by local people to walk their dogs.

Local parish Chairman, James Hunt, and the office manager to Gordon Henderson MP, Jess McMahon, investigated this matter and persuaded Swale Borough Council to take ownership of the land. The land has now been successfully transferred along with a sum of money for maintenance.

Swale Borough Council has plans to remove some of the fencing around the land, cut down the overgrown weeds and build a bridge over one of the nearby streams.

James Hunt said: 'I'm pleased that the transfer of the land has now been finalised and that the future maintenance costs aren't going to fall to the residents of Kingsferry Place.'

The parish council will continue to work with Swale Borough Council and outside organisations to ensure the land is managed to ensure it remains as intended for residents to enjoy and for nature to flourish.'

Jess McMahon said: 'The office of Gordon Henderson MP has been working with a number of residents across Sittingbourne and Sheppey regarding property management issues. This achievement shows that changes can be made and the fees can be reduced. 'We hope the residents of Iwade will continue to enjoy walking through the nature conservation land and looking after the wildlife living there.'

Iwade's Community Orchard

Did you fancy a flutter or go batty this summer? It was a cool summer night when 20 enthusiastic people from the community set out on a mission to discover who had taken up residency in their community orchard.



During the spring, evidence was discovered; yes! there were dragons in the undergrowth and beetles in the trees. Slow worms and common lizards were found warming themselves under mats laid down by children pre-Christmas and this was their reward.

But what did that summer night reveal? Following a talk about bats, their life style, their homes, their food and, no!, they are not blind, but their use of echo-location makes finding the next meal much easier.

The excited community group set off with bat detectors. Bat detectors pick up the echo-location sounds given out by the bats at a more audible level for the human ear. However, the night revealed very few bats; it was whelping time and mums and babies were well tucked up at home in their cosy holes in trees, roofs or bat boxes. Pipistrelle bats were found circling the church however; a majestic barn owl with beautiful cream plumage was seen hunting in the row of trees beyond.

After little luck with the bat detectors, our interest turned to the moths flying that night. A moth trap was set up in the new orchard. Were the mosquitoes flying? Yes and a few moths!



return to check it in the morning. We retreated to the cars and whilst packing away there was a friendly grunt from behind, yes we had a visitor to the orchard!



Mrs Tiggywinks, a hedgehog was making her way into the orchard. Watch out for her, we do not want to see her squashed on the road.

Later on during the summer we were pleased to welcome the Friends of the National Fruit collections, Brogdale. Members of this group descended from all over the country to discover why Iwade orchard was so important in Kent. With mouths agast at the survival of the 80 year old trees which were saved and relocated, their interest turned to the Noble Chafer and its home amongst those trees which despite looking dead, do have some life. Yes this little beetle and, at a glance by a specialist, two other beetles have made these not-so-dead trees their home. This orchard now has a new life with the new trees which have been planted during the spring ensuring the continuity of life for this endangered species.

As Robert says, "Cooking has become an integral part of people's lives nowadays; Ingredients and knowledge are available at people's fingertips like never before, but having the confidence to push yourself isn't easy so I am hoping to be able to help you".

So, Robert's first recipe is for "one of the easiest and most rewarding dressings I have ever come across, originally from Japan, but borrowed by me, this recipe is amazing with sushi and sashimi, or if that's not your kind of thing just simply drizzle it over salads. I promise you won't be disappointed, it keeps for easily a couple of months if stored correctly in an air tight container, warm it up with a hint of wasabi if you like things hot!

Ponzu dressing

- 1 tablespoon Lime zest
- 50ml sesame oil
- 50ml corn oil
- 150ml stock syrup
- 200ml Kikkoman soy sauce
- 75ml fresh lemon juice
- 1 dessert spoon crushed black pepper
- 25ml Worcester sauce

Mix all ingredients together, refrigerate - use as required, give it a cocktail shake before you use it.

Patient Group – Iwade Health Centre

Patient Groups work working together with GPs to improve services and to promote health and improved quality of care. Having a wide range of patients on board can only help for the future of Iwade Health Centre, so if you have an hour or two to spare every few months, please come along to have a chat with us. Being a part of the Patient Group will give you an idea of the problems and issues most health centres face, the biggest one currently being a lack of GPs available. But, you can make a difference by joining us and together we can work towards making Iwade Health Centre the best in the area.

The hottest topic for complaints is lack of appointments. It's not an easy one to solve and it's one that we, along with most other surgeries have to deal with. There's no quick fix and there's always work to do on it, but, one way we the patients can help, is to not miss our appointments!

The number of appointments missed in August alone was 135, including 40 for the GPs and 45 for the Practice Nurse. If you have a mobile phone, please register the number at IHC and you will be sent a reminder text before your appointment. If you use the online booking system, you can cancel appointments that way too!

We must all do our bit by remembering a booked appointment, add it to your paper diary, log it in your phone, write it on your shopping list, do what you need to do, but please don't forget your appointment!

Our next meeting is Monday 9th November from 7-8pm, if you're over 18 and a patient of IHC, you are more than welcome to attend.

IWADE PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES OF THE MEETING Held on Tuesday 9th September, 2015

The Chair introduced John Lancaster from Mongoose Energy; who had come to outline proposals relating to Orchard Farm Solar Farm in School Lane. The company wishes to help the community set up a Benefits Society (which is a type of co-op) and raise money to buy the solar farm from the developer. They run the farm on behalf of the community and any profits go back to the shareholders (members of the community can invest in shares) and into a community fund (they estimate this will equate to £80,000 per year; the project will span 25 years) which can then pay out grants to organisations for projects such as efficient lighting, loft insulation, solar heating, etc. There is also the prospect of cheaper electricity for households. The developer of the farm is OPDE; they asked Mongoose Energy to help them convert the project from purely commercial into community owned. Mongoose will be aiming to launch a share offer at the end of October and will be inviting local people to become members of the Co-operative; they will also be holding local events in Iwade and the surrounds to promote this, the first one being in mid-October. Mongoose Energy will be interested in hearing from anyone who would like to be on the Board of Directors.

Visitors/Public Time

•Visitors – A resident mentioned the Localism meeting and School Lane Playing Field/Pavilion; Clerk to arrange a meeting between the Iwade Herons and Parish Council and to organise a separate meeting with Persimmon to discuss this and other matters.

•A resident raised the issue of safety in Grovehurst Road; the problems pedestrians have crossing the A249 slip roads and the recent incident. The Chair advised that the Parish Council has consistently raised this in the past and KCC always waits for something to happen! The latest incident was reported to the Police. It was suggested arranging a meeting with the Highway Agency and others to look at the area and to see what can be done; the person involved in the incident is willing to attend the meeting.

•County and Borough Councillors – As he could not attend County Cllr. Truelove forwarded the following details: “He has arranged for improved signage and markings at the junction of Sanderling and the Street and will show the Parish Council what is planned. On School Lane, he is going to get the KCC Development team to discuss with the developers the lack of a good sight line for pedestrians and to look further at extra yellow markings.”

•Community Warden (Nick Mayatt)/PCSO - The Community Warden's report had been circulated. There are on-going problems on the new development (CSU, PCSO and Amicus are aware); fly tipping incidents in Sheppey Way and Old Ferry Road; incidents with youths in Woodpecker Park (he will speak to the PCSO regarding these) and there have been problems with the new road layout near to the Medical Centre.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

•Grovehurst Road Resurfacing and renewing White lining in the Village – Clerk has received a response from KCC: “At the December 2014 meeting, the condition of Grovehurst Road Gateway was part of the list of around twenty sites that were discussed. As with many sites, there was not the funding to carry out works there this year but rest assured the site will not be removed from the list until improvement work has been carried out. KCC will also be looking at the white lining.”

Iwade Localism Project (Swale Borough Council)

The Minutes of Localism Meeting held on Monday 7th September, 2015, were circulated. The Parish Council to sit down with Iwade Herons to look at how the Pavilion and field will be managed; there is a need to ensure that the field is open for everyone to use. Swale Borough Council is writing to the landowner of the Allotments to see if they will pass the lease on to either the Allotment Association or the Parish Council.

•Mansfield Drive Bridge- The Parish Council met with the Police,

Environment Agency and Swale Borough Council to look at the bridge. The Police, Parish Council and residents don't want it opened but unfortunately the Environment Agency has now confirmed that they will be opening it on Health and Safety grounds.

•Village Maintenance- The Chair mentioned weeds, the way grass cutting is being done, etc.; there are a lot of things that are not being carried out properly that the Parish Council could organise better. Going forward it looks as though more things will be pushed on to Parish Councils with cuts at KCC and the Borough Council; it might therefore be appropriate to employ someone as a general Handyman; perhaps something to look at when preparing next year's Budget.

•Grovehurst Roundabout- In light of the most recent incident it was agreed to arrange a site meeting with Kent Police, the Highways Agency, Iwade and Kemsley Borough Councillors, County Councillors and Gordon Henderson M.P. to look at what can be done to enhance pedestrian safety.

Any Other Matters Arising

•The Chair wished to place on record thanks to Rynn and Jackie Kemp, Graham Horner, Stephen Plumb and Matt Gale for helping move the compost into the planters and for Jamie Dicker for the use of his tipper truck. The Church is keen to adopt a planter and Tinkerbells are happy to look after one if someone sponsors it; they are keen on a wildlife garden. The Chair will speak to Ickles Pickles and Happy Days to see if they will sponsor/maintain the Grovehurst Road planters. Iwade Garage might be willing to sponsor a planter with one of the Nurseries maintaining it.

•Cllr. Gale advised that the draft contracts have now been received for the Vodafone Rural Signal, which just needs to be returned. Once up and running (hopefully by Christmas) it will cover the whole of the village.
